
Never has there been a better time


An Australian first – real-time, continuous disclosure of political donations

In 2005, Australia's first National Integrity System assessment saw Transparency International Australia make the first ever call for continuous, online disclosure of political donations – in place of current disclosure systems, where the public only gets to know who financed which candidates, months after casting their vote.

In February 2015, Queensland Attorney-General Yvette D'Ath MP committed to the introduction of this vital step toward greater integrity in politics - for the first time in Australia. Now hear her update on the implementation of this visionary move, and be part of the discussion about how other open government reforms can help us better control the risks of corruption.

What are we doing now, and what do our anti-corruption fighters need for us to do better? Hear from the head of the country's national centre for fighting corruption in both the public and private sectors.



A new federal anti-corruption agency - do we need one, and what would it look like?

In January, polling conducted by The Australia Institute showed 74% of Australians believe federal politicians are either just as, or more likely to fall prey to corruption than their State counterparts - and 82% support a new independent corruption watchdog to investigate corruption at the federal level.
